








Starry Night

<p>Star Stars are huge, glowing balls of gases. The closest star to Earth is the Sun. Most of the pinpricks of light that shine in the night sky are also stars.</p> <p>Nocturnal A word to describe animals that come out at night.</p> <p>Day The time of day when the sky is light.</p> <p>Night The time of day when the sky is dark.</p> <p>Shadow Sometimes objects can block light which means that no light is able to pass through that object. This causes a shadow/ outline of the object blocking the light.</p> 	<p>Questions to ask your child What do you know about night and day? What types of light do you know (e.g. natural or man-made)? What can you tell me about shadows?</p> <p>Activities to do together at home Make shadow nocturnal animals with your hands and a torch. Ask your child to use words (adjectives) to describe different nocturnal animals e.g. prickly, soft, feathery. Make a model of a nocturnal animal. Make a list of natural and man-made light together. Your child could draw pictures.</p>
